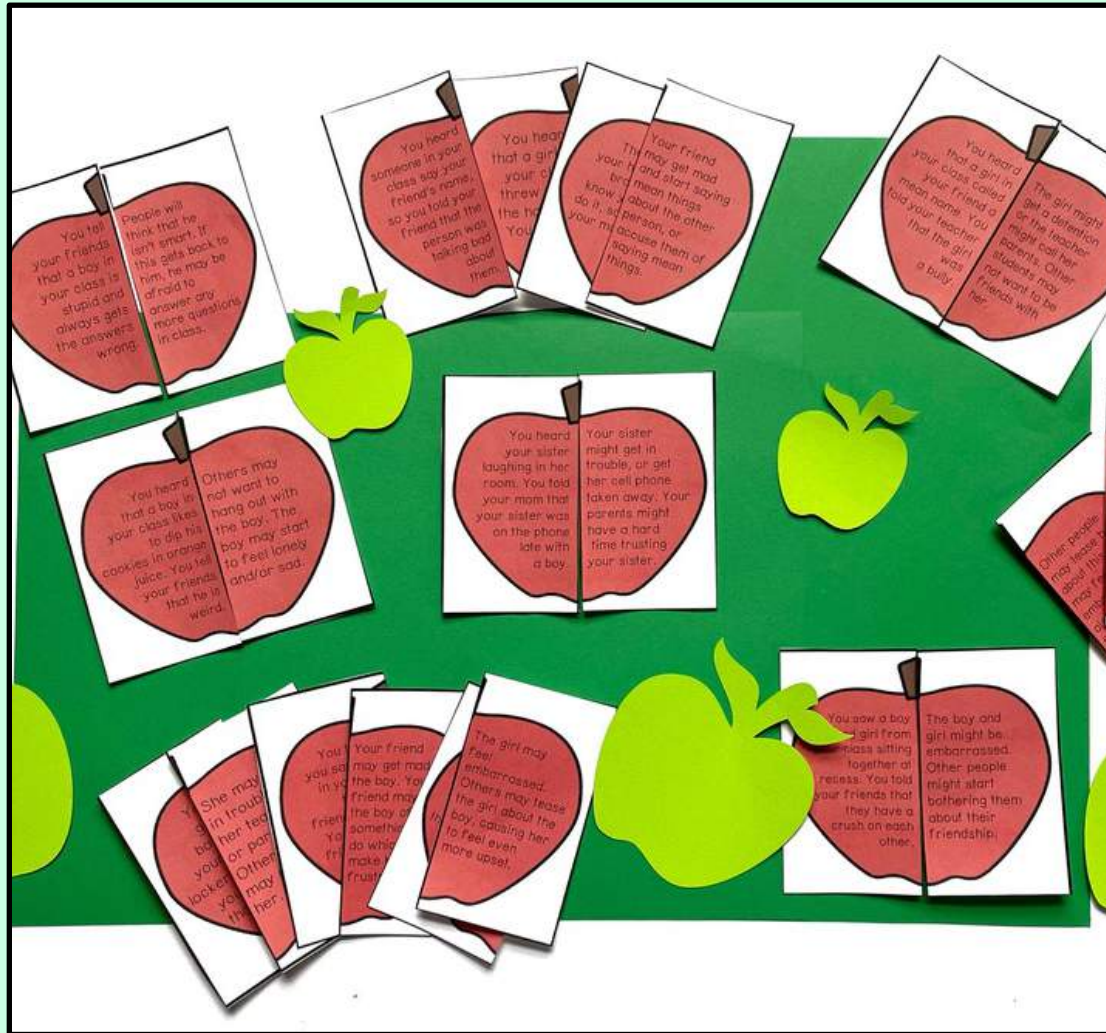

“Should I Share It?” Sorting Activity



Kids will look at 24 scenarios and decide whether or not they should tell others about what is happening. They will put the card in the corresponding envelope.

12 Matching Puzzles



Kids will look at 12 scenarios and think about what might happen if they share the information in the situation.

Then, they will match the scenario to what could potentially happen.

Use these cards to get kids talking about rumors and the impact they have on others.

Not everything is as it seems! It is important to think about what is REALLY happening! Look at each scenario and write about what could actually be happening.

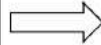
You hear that someone ran out of his classroom without asking. You think he was breaking school rules.



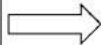
You see a girl in your class leave the bathroom with a sharpie in her hand. You think she might have drawn on the wall.



A plant in the classroom fell and broke. It was near Amelia's seat, so you think she knocked it over.

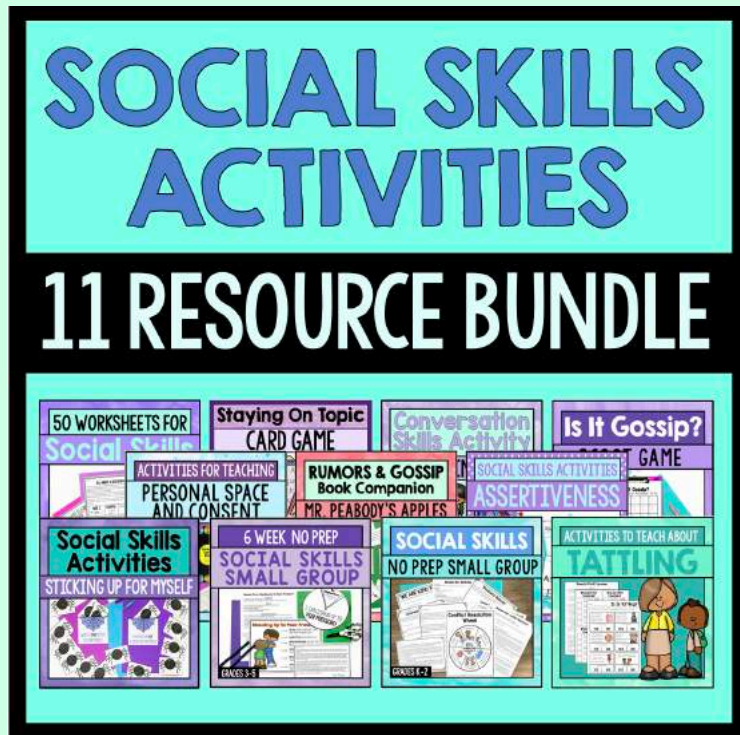


You see your brother looking in your mom's purse. You think he might be stealing something.
