- Students will learn about topics by looking at scenarios they experience in real life.

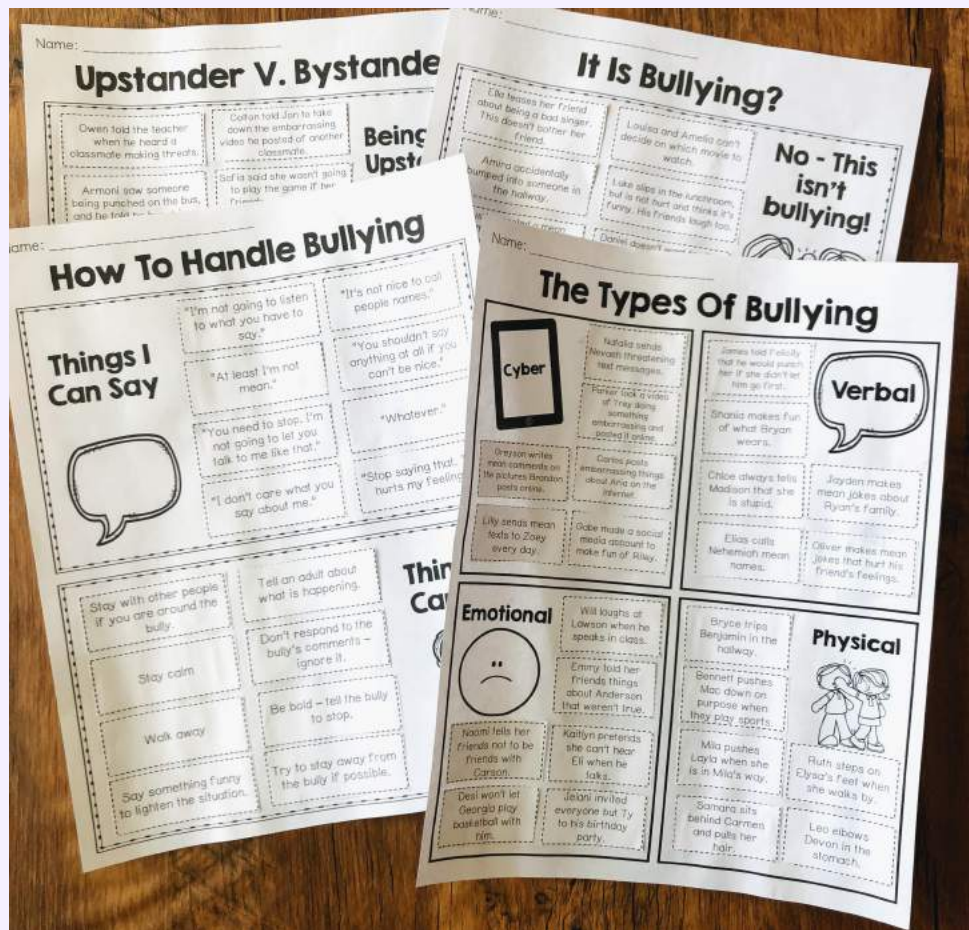
# How to use cut & paste activities:

- This resource contains 4 cut and paste activities that can be used individually, or as a set.

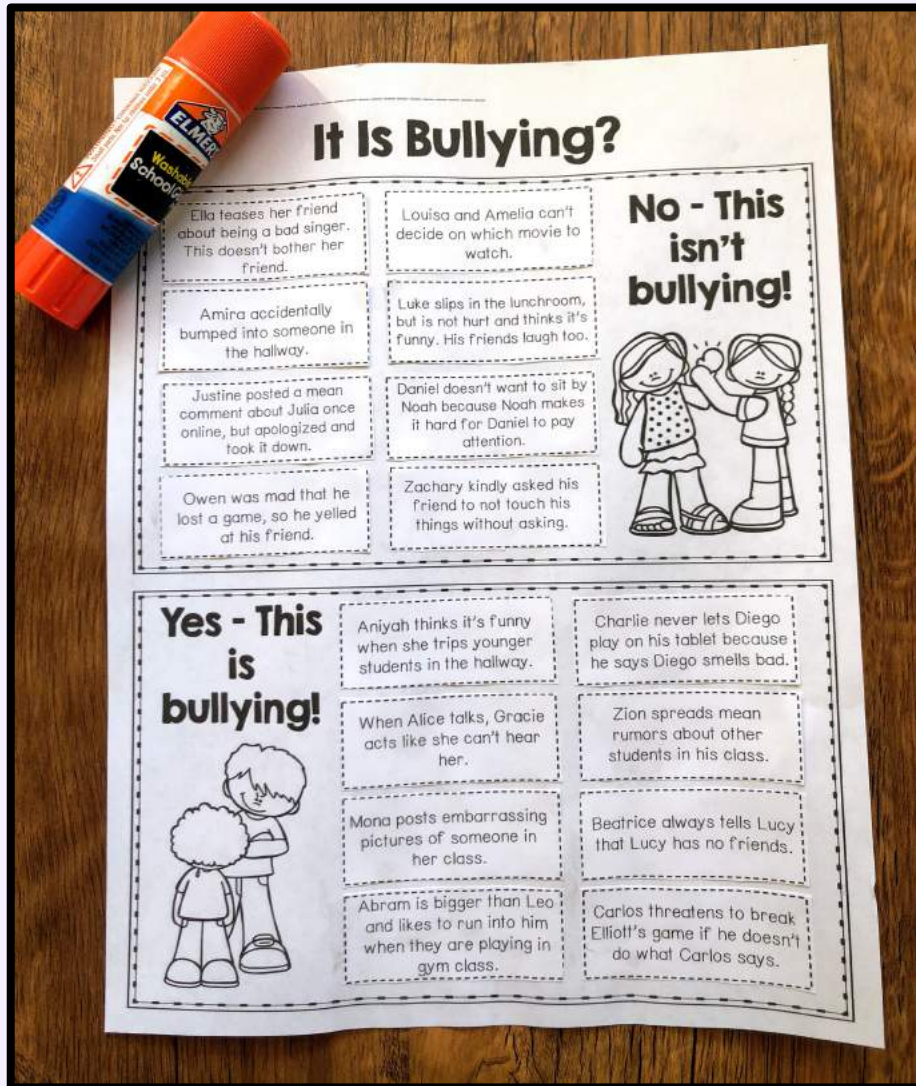
# Help your students learn about bullying prevention with these 4 cut and paste activities!

- Students who have been targets of bullying or aggressive behaviors

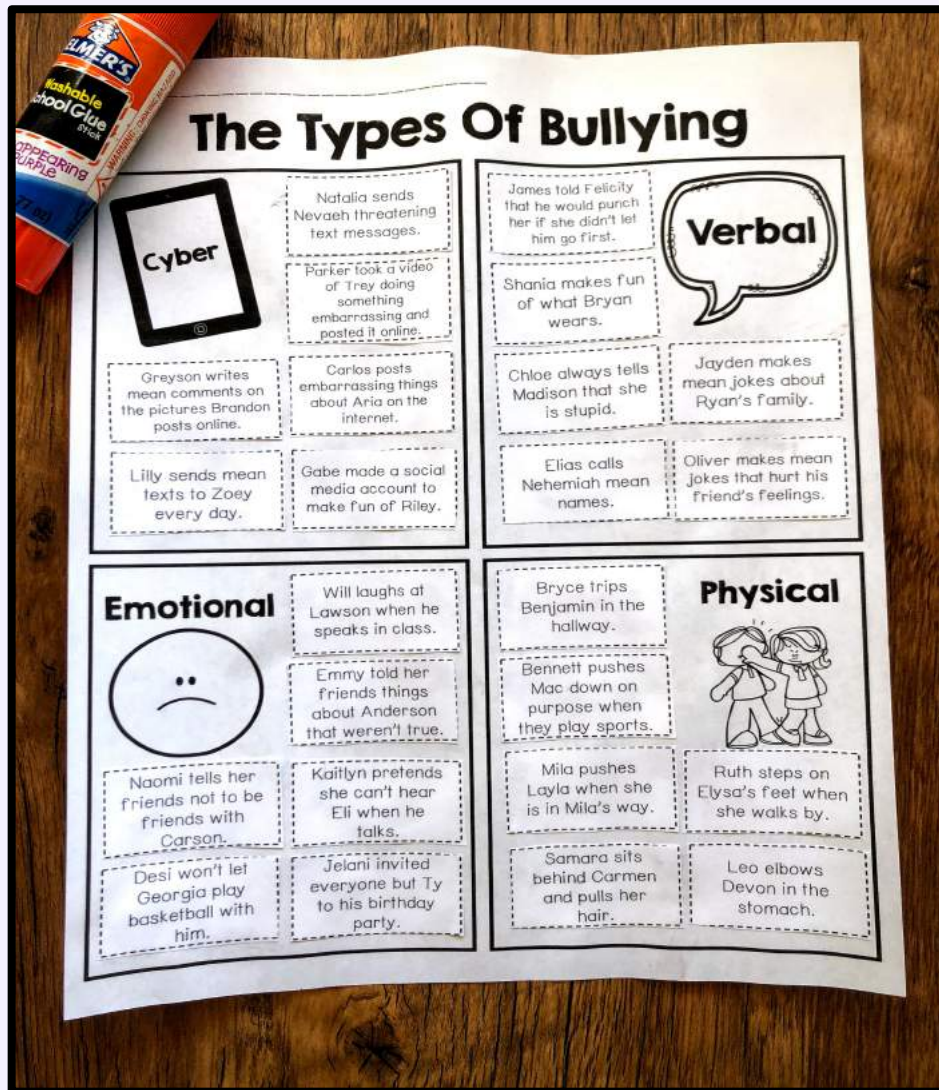


# “Is It Bullying?”

# “Types Of Bullying”

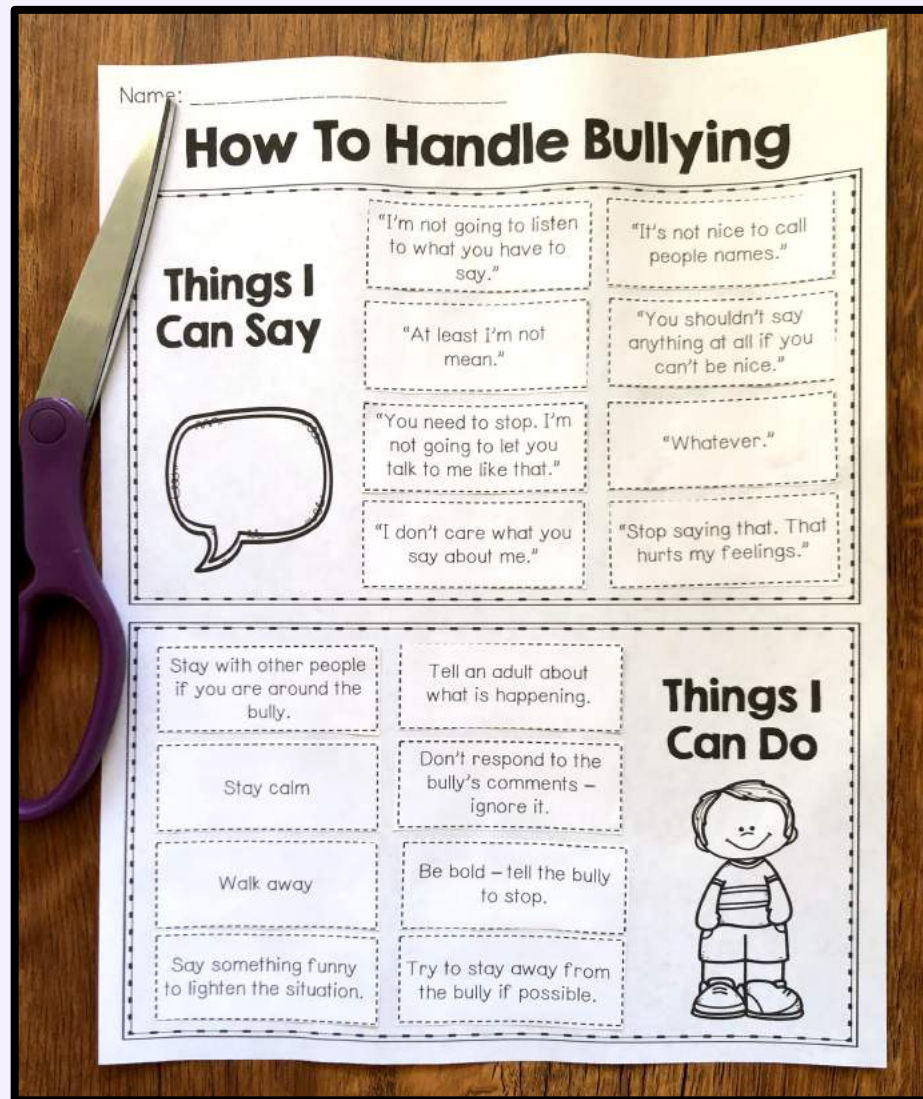


Students will learn about four types of bullying:

<b>Being A Bystander</b> 	Luis didn't know what to do when he saw his friend kicking someone, so he just walked away.	Kenya laughs when someone makes fun of her friend's shoes.
	David saw his brother shove someone, but didn't tell anyone.	Molly made fun of someone in her class because everyone else was doing it.
	Matthew knew about a threatening text message his friend received, but didn't say anything to anyone.	Ebony's friend told her she wasn't allowed to talk to Crista because she smells. Ebony listened to her friend.
	Jackson doesn't want to tell an adult about a bully because he doesn't want to get in trouble.	Bailey is afraid to stand up for her friend because she doesn't want to be picked on.

Students will learn about what it means to be an upstander and a bystander.

They will look at 16 scenarios and decide whether the scenario describes an upstander or a bystander.

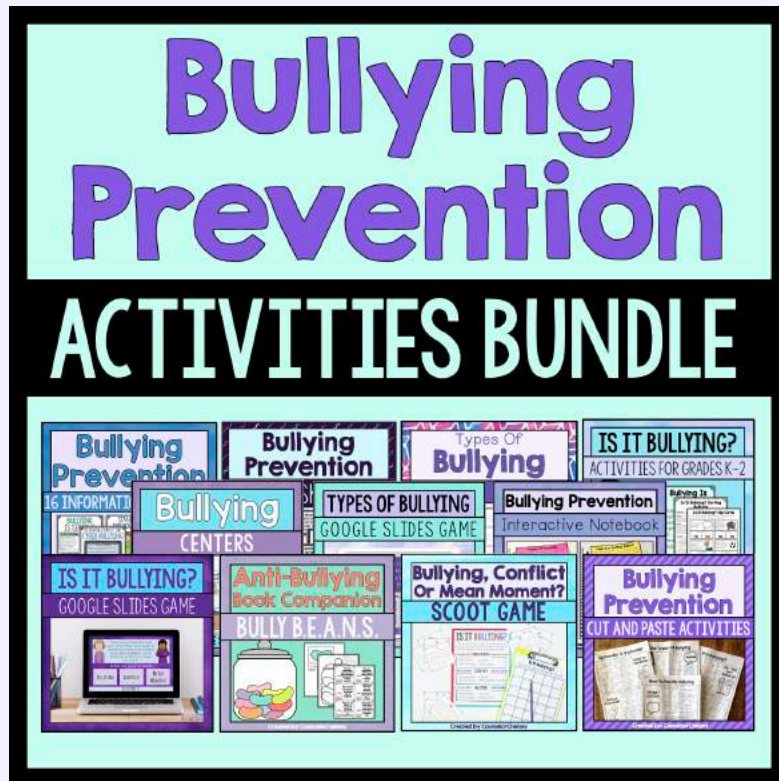
