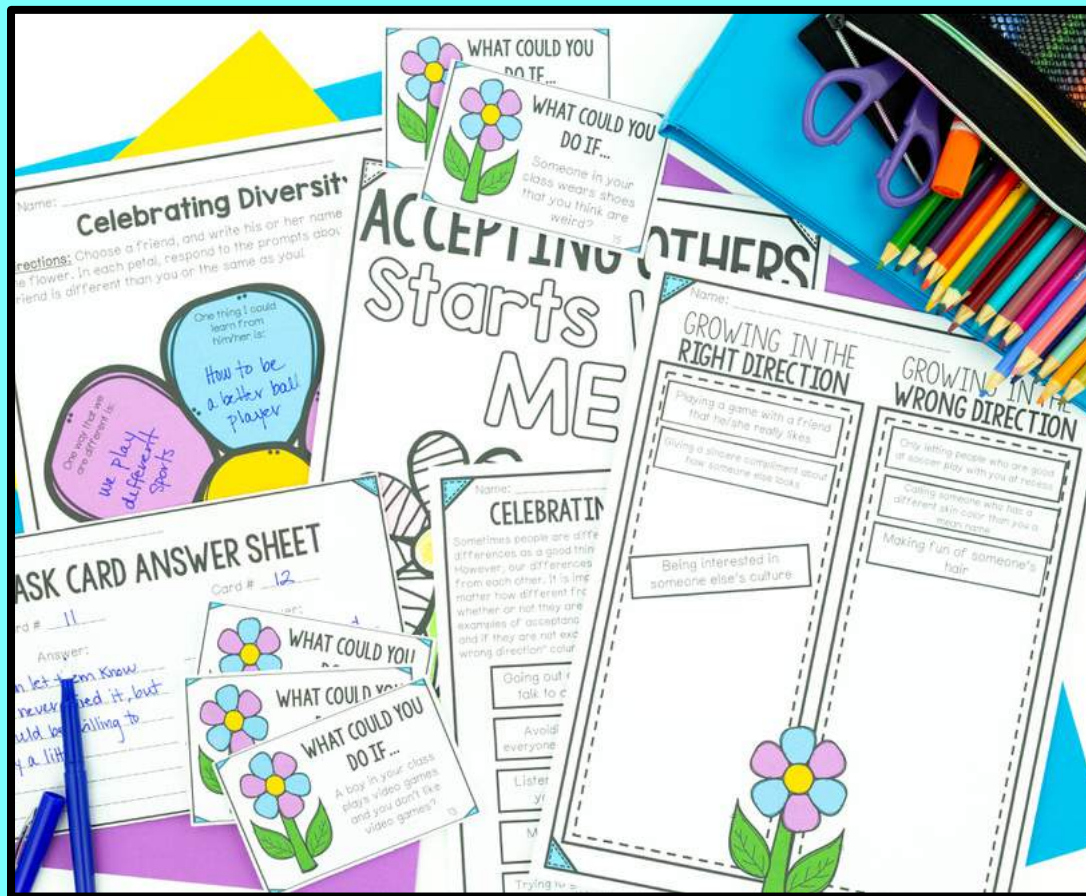


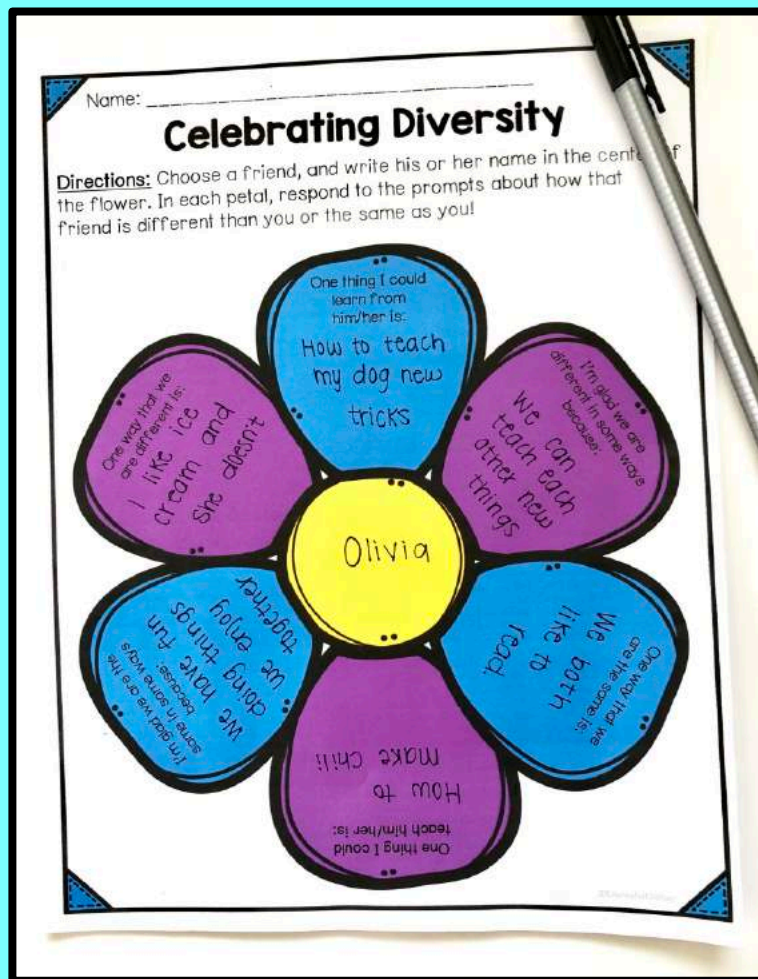
# Help your students learn to embrace diversity and celebrate their differences!

# “CELEBRATING DIVERSITY” WORKSHEET



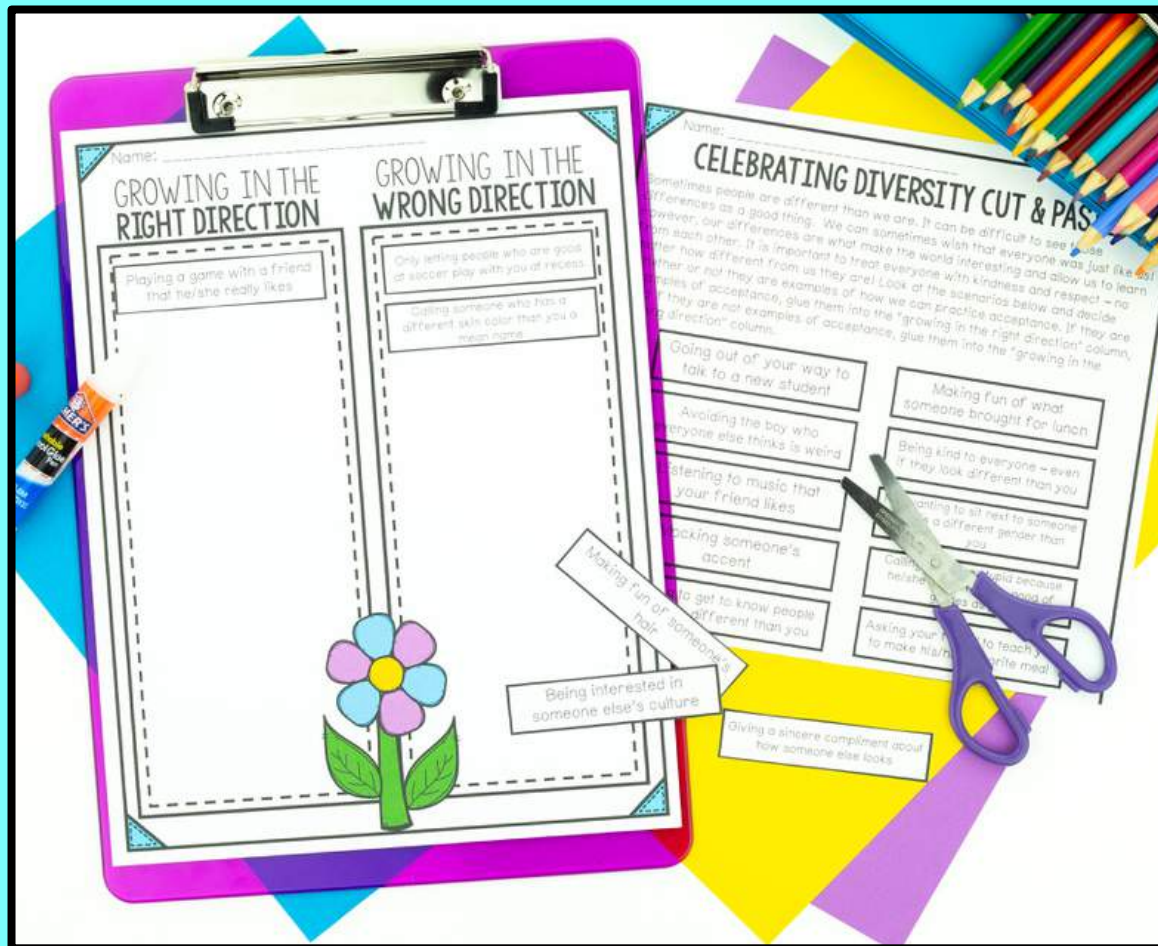
Students will choose a peer and then answer prompts about how that peer is the same as them and different than them!

# “ACCEPTING OTHERS” COLORING SHEET



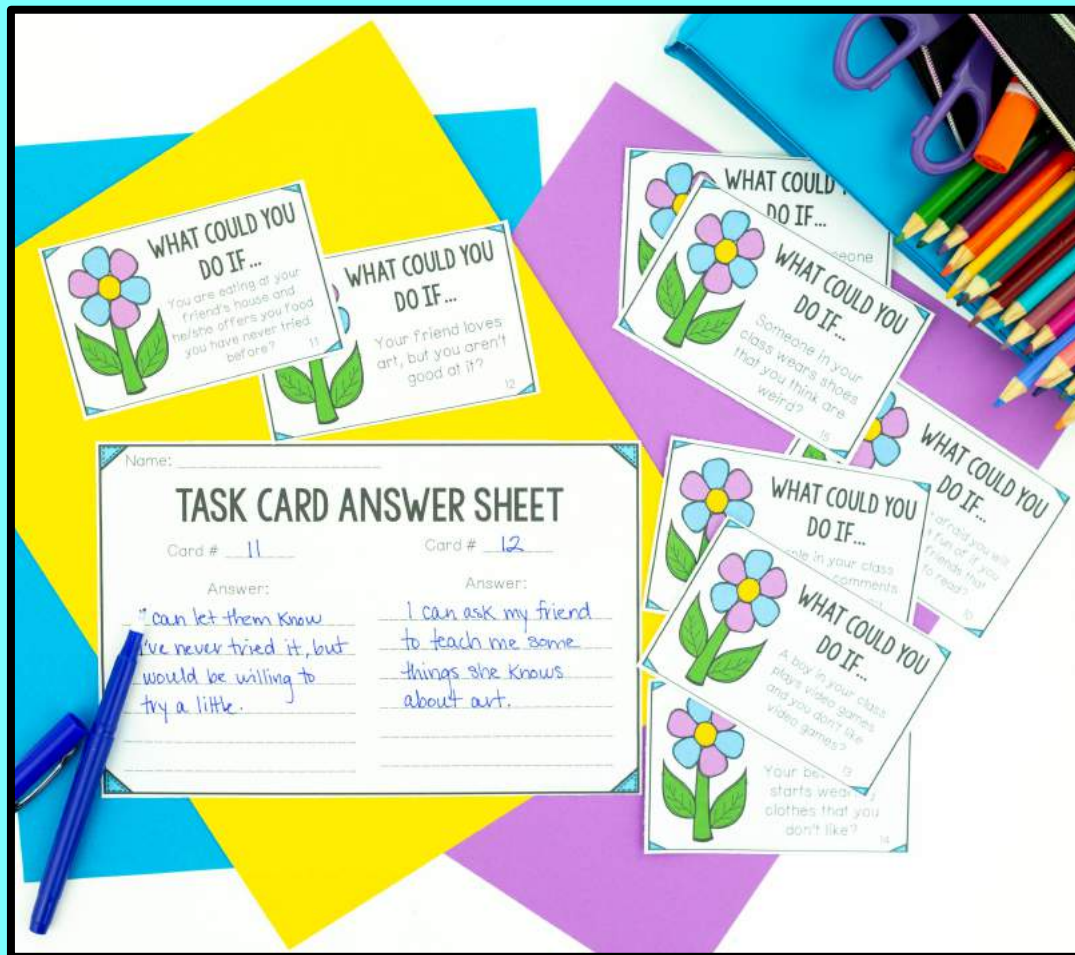
Students can color this sheet and take it home, or the sheets can be used as part of a classroom or hallway display!
